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Transforming Your Work

Ask yourself:

- Is the audience the same?
- Is the tone too informal?
- Where is more development needed?
- What visual elements need to be converted into prose?

Selecting the Journal

- Visibility in the field
- Editor and board members
- Peer review process
- Long citation half-life
- Circulation/Accessibility
- Lag time from acceptance to publication
- Acceptance rate

Before you start writing...

- ■Read two or three articles in the journal.
- Read the submission guidelines carefully.
- ■Examine the journal's style.
- ■Make sure that your manuscript matches the focus of the journal.

As you write . . .

- ■Focus, and support that focus.
- Develop your focus within the context of the field.
- Answer the "why should I read this article" question quickly.
- ■Illustrate each point with concrete examples.
- ■Pay attention to prose.
- ■Cite sources thoughtfully.
- **■**Come full circle.

Before you submit . . .

- ■Run a spell-check.
- ■Use the writing resources available to you.
- ■Ask a colleague to read your work.
- Send your manuscript to only one journal at a time.
